ABOUT THE COURSE

This course is a work-based qualification; to apply you must already be employed as a student veterinary nurse in an approved training practice. There, you'll complete 1,800 practical hours and will attend WUC one day a week.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT

Written and practical assessments set by VetSkill must be passed during the course. Additionally the College set written assignments and examinations must be completed successfully. In addition all students will complete a Online Portfolio of Skills during their clinical placement that will be used as part of the assessment process. Once all elements of the course are complete the student will be able to register as a Veterinary Nurse.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

- 5 GCSEs at Grade 9-4 or A*-C
- Must include English, Maths and Science
